English

Tricky word - like

If your child is unsure of what this word says - attempt to sound talk it and it will make no sense! It will sound like lickee! They just need to know it says like. Can they put it into some sentences orally? I.e. I like to go to the park. I like to eat apples.

Can they make a little book of things they like? Using an A4 piece of paper folded into quarters they could cut to make a little book or write on each rectangle.

Differentiation:

- a) write I like ... and they draw a picture of what they like
- b) write I like ... draw a picture and label it ie cars
- c) write simple sentences using capital letters and full stops. (this could be in their red exercise books too). I.e. I like fish and chips. I like to go on my bike. I like to swim in the pool. I like to run and jump in the garden.

Phonics

**Phonics Play** - the website has recently been updated but you will be given a user name and password to log in.

Go to **Flash Cards Speed Trial - phase 3** - this will give you the graphemes starting with j and finishing with er.

You need to play this with your child as you will need to click on the tick if they are able to say the sounds. You can click on the cross if your child is unsure of what it says and you can print the results so you can keep a log of any they need to work on.

**Tricky Word Trucks - Phase 3** again you may just concentrate on tricky words or you may play the game using tricky words and HFW (high frequency words)

Again you need to play this with your child and you can print the results

Recap reading **have**, **some** and **come** from yesterday.

**Reading:** have a go at reading the attached sentences from Phase 3 Letters and Sounds. If you go onto the Letters and Sounds Website you can choose Phase 3 or Phase 4 for more challenging reading.

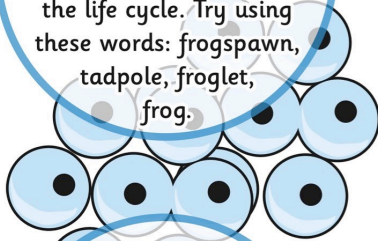
### Maths

Using the idea below - have some pretend frogs (green circles of card with eyes drawn on!) and make up some number stories i.e. 10 frogs sat on a log and 5 jumped into the pond. How many frogs were left on the log? Could your child record this number sentence? Take a photo to post on Tapestry, write the number sentence  $10 - 5 = 5$  etc

# Frog Life Cycle

## Home Learning Challenge

Look at the pictures of the life cycle of a frog. Can you put them into the correct order? Talk about what happens in the life cycle. Try using these words: frogspawn, tadpole, froglet, frog.



'Frog' and 'dog' are rhyming words. What other words can you think of that rhyme with 'frog'? Listen carefully to the sounds at the end of the words.

Try making a model about part of the life cycle of a frog! You could use playdough, paper, empty cardboard boxes or tubes, yoghurt pots or plastic bottles. You could make frogspawn, a tadpole, a froglet or frog.



Teach someone at home the rhyme 'Five Little Speckled Frogs'. Use your fingers to help you count how many frogs are left on the log each time.



There are 6 frogs on a lily pad. If 3 jump into the water, how many would be left on the lily pad? You could use your fingers or draw a picture to help you.



Frogs are very good at jumping! Show someone at home how good you are at jumping – remember to bend your knees!
