 - Why do you think people wanted to celebrate?
 - How do we celebrate something special?

Your challenge - should you wish to accept - is to plan and prepare for a party tomorrow!

There are some resources below and I am sure many more online but some ideas to get you started ...

1. What food might you have at a party? If you were going to have a picnic what could you have? You could ask your family what their favourite sandwiches are? How will you record what they said? Will you write a list or draw a picture of it? What is their favourite cake?
2. Making food to eat at a party - could you help to make sandwiches, cakes, jelly, decorate biscuits etc?

Friday 8th May 2020 is the 75th anniversary of VE Day.




